Concern has been expressed about the lack of attention placed on SVAWG, the adequacy of the police response, inadequate street lighting and safety measures in some parts of the ward and the absence of available local advice and support.

# The LWSP has three phases:

- \* To establish the extent and nature of SVAWG through a survey and local meetings with women, to be put into a report made available to Lewisham Council, Lewisham Police, the Ladywell and Safer Neighbourhood Forums
- \* To identify areas lacking street lighting/safety measures where women feel particularly vulnerable
- \* To provide a contact point, advice and support for those facing street SVAWG
- \* To use the survey and women's experiences to work with Lewisham Police, VAWG advice agencies and Lewisham Council to improve the response to SVAWG in Ladywell and across the borough.

Activities: physical games - dancing, football, crafts, den building, and sensory play, crafting and making healthy meals to share with their families - the aim is to stimulate participants and combat regression, and let them play & socialise like other children.

The impact of Covid on children in special schools has been immense - most regressed to a significant degree in terms of communication and socialisation skills, many developing anxiety and challenging behaviour, which, has impacted on the mental health and well-being of whole families.
